Commentary - by Frank Almade '71 Fight for life--for all it's worth

January 22, 1974 was the first anniversary of the Supreme Court abortion decision.

To give visible witness to the growing prolife movement, the first National Respect for Life March on Washington was held. About 15 thousand people, including one thousand from western Pennsylvania, converged on the Capital.

In the morning, groups of pro-life citizens lobbied for support in the offices of congressmen. In the afternoon, the pro-lifers formed a "Circle of Life" around the Capitol Building to hear speeches from congressional supporters and leaders of the pro-life movement.

The day marked the start of an intensified campaign for the passage of a Human Life Amend-ment to the U.S. Constitution, sponsored by Rep. Lawrence J. Hogan, R-Md.

This proposed amendment is bottled up in the House Judiciary Subcommittee chaired by Rep. Don Edwards, D-Cal. With the support of committee chairman, Rep. Peter Rodino, D-N.J., Edwards has made it clear he plans to sit on the proposal without hearings until he feels a majority of Congress would support it.

To bypass this, Hogan has initiated a discharge petition to release the bill from the subcommittee without hearings.

Due to the controversy over the amendment, the members are reluctant to sign the petition. It seems they do not want to take a public stand on this vital issue.

We urge each and every alumnus to write your congressman, not demanding he necessarily take the same view on the amendment as you, but asking only that the democratic process be allowed to function. "One man rule" is archaic and wrong. On such a vital issue, hearings should at least be held, regardless of the chairman's personal views.

For the congressman, there are hard political realities involved beside the moral problems. To represent the people, he must know what we want and believe. Without our support, he would not be in Washington.

So write--it need only be a few lines sincerely stating your position and request. You have a right to insist on an answer from your elected representative. If you don't get one, write again and ask why not.
